

The Feminist Library's Music Program for Women's History Month, March 2021



London's Feminist Library will spend Women's History Month celebrating women in music. It has an exciting range of events planned, covering unknown female composers, experimental composition, digital musicians, Italian feminist activist music and sound system culture.

Join online events, discussions and live performances on Zoom. Tune in to a podcast and live radio show, on-demand film screenings, and a musical social media takeover!

Podcast Launch – <u>Joanna Ward</u> and <u>Lola de la Mata</u> discuss Open Scores, Text Scores and Verbal Scores

Often regarded as lesser than Western Classical Notation, we will illustrate how such scores reshaped the landscape for amateurs – women, queer and other minority groups who utilised them within their artistic practices as a means of collaborating more freely, making space for the individuality of the musician, performer and/or audience.

<u>BISHI</u> is a singer, electronic rock-sitarist, composer, producer, and

performer born in London of Bengali heritage. As a multi-instrumentalist, she has been trained in both Hindustani and Western Classical styles and studied the sitar under Gaurav Mazumdar, a senior disciple of Ravi Shankar.

BISHI has written, performed and released two albums and five EP's on her own label Gryphon Records to critical acclaim. Her most recent single 'Don't Shoot The Messenger,' was produced by Tony Visconti.

BISHI is the founder of <u>WITCiH</u>: The Women in Technology Creative Industries Hub, a platform elevating Womxn in Tech. She launched the podcast 'Creative Women in Tech,' in May 2020.

Chisara Agor will give a short introduction to her practice in conversation with a guest (TBA), followed by a live performance where she will share music from her last EP 'In-Between', and new works from her upcoming EP 'Shadows and Searchlights'. Chisara Agor is an inter-disciplinary artist from Peckham, London. Her works span the music, theatre and art world grounded in her

philosophical practice and desire to create work that speaks and engages with the wider community and human condition.

MA Students from the Women In Music course at the RCM have created an exhibition of 14 women composers and their music. This will be displayed as an online archive on the Feminist Library's website.

As a composer and sound artist Diana's practice-led research examines spatial composition and interpretation in electronic music and issues concerning the performance practice of electronic music, and interdisciplinary discourse.



26th March, 6:30pm - 8:30pm Rediscovering Donna Circo, the first Italian Feminist Album -Live performances and talk and Zoom

In 1974 the song writer Paola Pallottino and the singer Gianfranca Montedoro recorded the first

Italian feminist album. Sadly, Donna Circo has never been released or distributed. 45 years later, a group of musicians fall in love with the album again and decide to reinterpret the twelve original tracks.

The Feminist Library was founded in 1975 by a small group of passionate volunteers at the height of the Women's Liberation Movement. It boasts an incomparable collection of over 7,000 books, 1,500 periodical titles from around the world, several archives of feminist individuals and organisations, pamphlets, papers, posters, and ephemera.

With no government or external funding, it has survived for nearly 46 years by the goodwill and passion of dedicated volunteers and the support of the public. It welcomes visitors of any gender. It is committed to a community policy that is intersectional, non-sectarian and trans-inclusive.

The Library has a vibrant book club, shop, arts and community programme. As well as enabling research and activism, it provides a space in London for feminists and community groups to have meetings, readings, exhibitions and events. The Library supports not just archiving work, but also independent producers and artists, and publishes zines.
